Across the 12 nations that make up the Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS), millions of men, women and children live in heartbreaking

poverty. The causes are many—rampant unemployment, family dysfunction, alcoholism, drug abuse, mental health issues, and a multitude of other tragedies. But they all have one common need—to hear of Christ's love and the power of the Gospel to change their lives for eternity.

In Belarus and Ukraine, SGA-sponsored missionary pastors and their churches

are reaching out to these families by distributing much needed food items and other aid as God provides. In report after report, we see wonderful fruit being gathered as destitute families see His love in action. Pastor Vasily Shemetov has been distributing food in Belarus' Gomel region, and the Lord has blessed his labors . . .

I thank and praise God for the opportunity to preach the Gospel through Compassion Ministry. God uses the food packs to help open hearts to receive the Gospel. One family refused all help and even the food, but the Lord blessed us with another family to help—a Roma family with five children. The oldest daughter, Sveta, already has her own family.

They attend Sunday worship with their children. Please keep praying for the families receiving help—that God will soften their hearts to the truth.

In Russian-speaking countries, this year we will celebrate Easter on Sunday, April 20, according to the Eastern calendar. As we prepare for this year, I can't help but remember how special last Easter was for our church, as it was for all our churches in Belarus. Our Lord Iesus conquered the grave, and now heaven is open to all of us who believe in and confess Jesus as our Savior! I want to share with you some of the joy that came to us that day!

The church was filled with lots of new people. Yuri is an ex-officer and we have been spending time together walking in the morning. Because of his keen mind, I presented him with a Russian-language MacArthur Study Bible and Evidence That Demands a Verdict by Josh McDowell. Yuri not only came to church, but he brought his friend Igor along with him. In their words, the service "left a bright star" in their hearts!

Alina made the service complete with her repentance. She had been invited to church by our son Nikolai last Christmas, and she began to attend services plus the youth meetings. She responded to

God's call on that Resurrection Sunday! A week later, a young man named Maxim came forward for repentance. He is one of four men who are addicted to alcohol and had been in church on Easter. Before the church, he knelt down with me and prayed, "Please, help me to be free!" Then 14-year-old Liza repented. She studies in the same grade as my daughter Lusia. Liza is an adopted child—taken away from her parents at age 5 because of their alcoholism. She has been living with one of our church families for seven years, and at last God touched her heart to respond. It was a great joy for her new family, as well as for all the church.

Please pray for all of our new brothers and sisters, that they will grow in their faith and new life in Christ!

According to our most recent reports, 165 families in Ukraine were reached with food parcels. Of that number, 265 were adults and 366 were children. In Belarus, 540 families have been reached with food aid. A total of 26 people repented and came to faith in Christ, while 69 adults and 87 children are now attending the church. UKRAINE

A recent *New York Times* article noted that although those who call themselves Jewish in the region are dwindling, a Jewish identity is still very visible. And in this region, SGA-sponsored missionary pastor Viktor Lokaichuk labors to reach local orphans with the help of SGA partners . . .

With your help, we continue our Orphans Reborn ministry in children's home No. 5 in the city of

### CIS in the News

#### Ukraine: Radical Islam on the Rise?



In Ukraine's Crimea region on the Black Sea, a radical Islamic political party called Hizb ut-Tahrir (Party of Freedom) is gaining in influence, and is causing alarm even among other Muslims. In the Crimean capital of Simferopol, more than 1,000 bearded men gathered last summer for a rally waving white flags and shouting, "Allahu Akbar," the Islamic cry meaning "Allah is Greatest." Hizb ut-Tahrir is banned in several countries, but is showing surprising strength in Crimea, a holiday resort region that also has a significant Muslim Tatar minority.

The stated goal of the party is to re-establish a Caliphate—a pan-Islamic state based on Islamic law as in the medieval era, but the local office told AFP News that their ambition of reviving the Caliphate does not extend to Ukraine. He said the party's presence in Crimea is "educational." The Spiritual Board of Muslims of Crimea, which is the main umbrella group for Crimean Tatars, is calling on Ukrainian authorities to take a closer look at Hizb ut-Tahrir's activities.

Of all the former Soviet nations, Ukraine enjoys the greatest amount of religious freedom. Our prayer is that God will restrain any effort to hinder the Gospel, as well as any move toward the violence and bloodshed connected with radical Islam.

# Canadian Connection

Describing 17<sup>th</sup> century London and Paris, Charles Dickens' memorable words, "It was the best of times. It was the worst of times," also accurately describes two locations that I recently visited in Ukraine: Buzivka—a village, and Uman—a small city.

Other than Kiev, Odessa, and a couple of larger cities, the majority of Ukrainians live either in villages or smaller cities. For nearly all Ukrainian villages, it is the worst of times. Having been established to house workers on collective farms that transitioned to corporate farms after Perestroika, many villages are slowly dying. For small to larger Ukrainian cities, it is comparatively the best of times. Those with an infrastructure and employment attract people from nearby villages.

**Buzivka** is a village of about 2,500 people, 150 km south of Kiev. Other than having one of the best bakeries in Ukraine that attracts a few people on their way to Odessa, Buzivka has no reason to exist. By contrast, **Uman**—50 km farther south—is a bustling university city with support services for 90,000 residents, many of whom are students.

When it comes to Buzivka and Uman, there is a tale to be told and that tale involves SGA/Canada-supported, young missionary pastor Vasily Furta. Vasily lives in Buzivka, where a vibrant growing congregation is impacting their region for Christ. As one of the Buzivka pastors, Vasily and ministry teams from their mother church have planted

multiple churches in their regions. Because young adults are integral parts of those teams, they have a reason to stick around.

A year ago, Vasily and another ministry team made up mostly of young adults began work in Uman. Although there are two other churches, neither was reaching Uman's young adults. By God's grace, Vasily and team are. Meeting in rented facilities, their Sunday morning service now numbers about 40. The driving force behind the Sunday attendance is a monthly Thursday night youth meeting where more than 30 older teens and young adults gather for excellent music, Bible study, and fellowship.

With new believers, this congregation will soon outgrow their rented facilities. For that reason, with the encouragement and support of their mother church in Buzivka, the Uman congregation is asking the Lord to provide property where they can eventually build a House of Prayer. Like the previous Buzivka region church plants, this will require the Lord's provision. Even though the Buzivka congregation and the core group will do their best, they will need the help of SGA prayer and ministry partners. If the Lord brings this together, few locations are more deserving of your support and of a construction ministry team than Uman.

By God's grace, it is the best of times for the believers in both Buzivka and Uman.
